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Registration - avoiding the "Weakest Link"

By now everyone's probably in the full swing of Scouting. **Registrations** are being completed at the Scout Office as I write this. As a reminder of the registration process, a Youth is a registered member in Scouting once the parent submits a signed registration form to a Scouter. Once the completed form is submitted, the Youth can fully participate in the Scouting program (ie. Meetings, day outings, camps). If this registration is part of the initial registration process in the fall, then the registration must be received at the District Office by October 10th (District will then have it into Regional Office by October 31st). If the Youth was registered in any section of Scouting the previous year, then the current registration is considered a renewal.

If a person would like to participate in the Scouting movement prior to joining, then he/she can attend a maximum of three events (ie meetings, outings) before he/she must be registered. If this registration is not part of the Group's fall initial registration process, then the Group must deliver it to the Wellington District Scout Office within three weeks of the date of the parent's signature on the registration form. (District must have it into Regional Office within six weeks.)

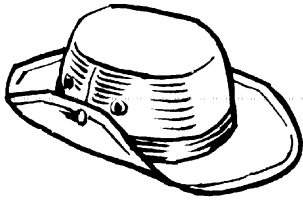
A membership in Scouting includes insurance for the participant. By following the above procedures, should an accident happen while participating in Scouting activities, the participant is covered. Failure to comply with the above procedures would mean, should an accident happen, the person who fails to follow the proce-

about the Highland Games, for you folks in Fergus seeking volunteers? It would need a bit of planning, on everyone's part, for next year. Groups would need to know, well in advance, where they are short of adults. Maybe Group Committee, the Colony, the Pack, and the Troop. Could a Company be started if the volunteers were there? 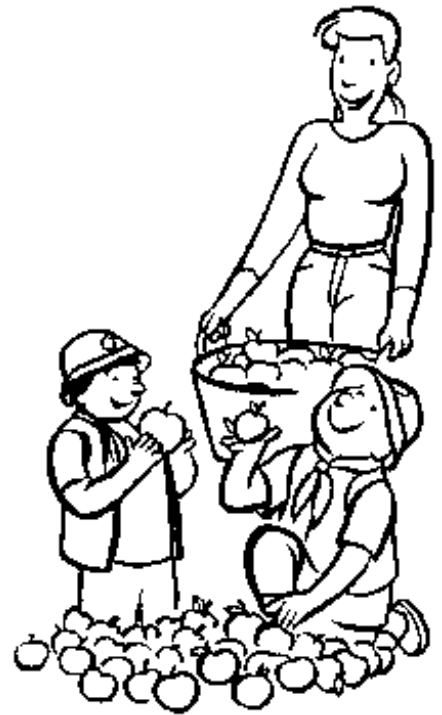

Council Meetings

Our last Council meeting was held Wednesday, September 26, 2001. Attendance at the meeting was very poor. Only seven Groups of twenty were present. I realize that we are all volunteers and as such time is sometimes a short commodity. However, to ensure our youth have the full benefit of Scouting, Group representation must exist at District Council meetings. It is at these meetings, where Scouting decisions that affect everyone within Wellington District are made. In order for voting to take place at these meetings, a minimum of ten Goups must be present at these meetings. As the budget was not ready for our Annual General Meeting in May, the Executive promised to have the budget ready for approval at the September Council meeting.

The poor attendance at the meeting re-

sulted in the budget not being approved. Because there were only seven Groups present, no voting could take place. Our **next meeting will be Wednesday, November 28, 2001** (not November 21, 2001 as the District Calendar says) at the 1 Stone Rd Complex. At this meeting, we would like to have our District Budget approved. To do this, we need to have a quorum – ten Groups present. It is the responsibility of each Group Committee to have a minimum of three members present at each of the council meetings – one Administration Scouter, one Section Scouter, and one Youth member. Please ensure you have your voice heard and vote count at the next (and subsequent) Council meetings.

Goal Setting

As the District President, one of my goals is to increase Group participation at council meetings. If you have any suggestions on how this District can accomplish this please let me know. The executive is willing to have a guest speaker after the business section of the Council meetings. If you have any topic suggestions for a guest speaker please let me know. The next meeting agenda will once again be "WELLINGTON DISTRICT BUDGET APPROVAL".

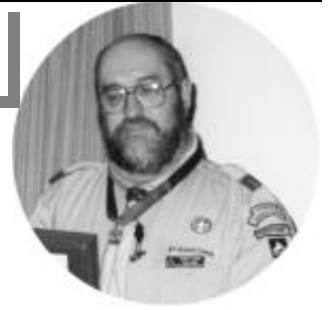

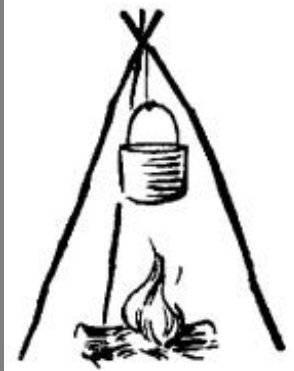

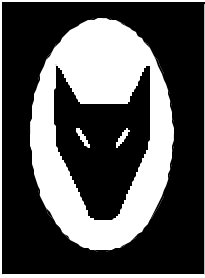

Alternatives to Violence Program Offered



The Alternatives to Violence Program (AVP) was introduced in prisons in the United States in 1975 in order to give inmates skills for coping with stressful, aggressive, or even violent situations. The Alternatives to Violence program is now an international program, taught by qualified facilitators all over the world. Recently, the AVP organization chose to reach out and offer their programs in the community.

There are three levels to the AVP program--level 1, level 2, and facilitator. There are no limits on the number of times each level may be taken. At the completion of each level, the participant is given a certificate.

Everyone experiences conflict in his or her life, even with himself or herself. Through games, activities, and discussions, the volunteer AVP facilitators teach participants to define violence, gauge and control their own emotional response to conflict as well as expressing their concerns or wishes, and LISTENING to the views and needs of others.

FACTS, FEELINGS, AND FAIR SOLUTIONS: The goal is to learn several strategies in order to find an acceptable and peaceful solution. Resolution is only reached if all parties are mutually satis-

fied. Therefore, 'wimping out' (being bullied) or forcing your will (bullying) is not seen as 'resolution'.

On the weekend of November 10th-11th, a Community AVP is being held at Barber Scout Camp. Interested Scout Leaders are welcome to attend. Enrollment is limited to approximately 20 participants. The cost is \$30.00 to cover the facility rental and meals. The course runs from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm Friday evening, 8:00 am to 9:00 pm on Saturday, and 1:00 pm to 6:00 pm on Sunday. The program does not begin until 1:00 pm on Sunday to allow participants to attend Remembrance Day services. After a weekend like this one, participants feel as if they have been on a journey together. Therefore, for the cohesion of the group, participants are discouraged from signing up unless they are able to commit their full time and attention to the AVP weekend. In order to receive Level 1 certification, participants must be present for all sessions.

A less emotionally intense weekend, referred to as 'AVP light' can be arranged for your troop, company, or crew. Please contact Ellen Webb at 833-7153 or EllenandGordon@sympatico.ca if you would like more information, or to register for the November 10th program.

District Council - September 26 Meeting Minutes



Meeting was called to order at 7:37 P.M.

As there were only 7 Groups in attendance, this meeting was held as an information meeting only as a quorum was not present. Business could not be conducted.

1. Approval of agenda

Paul Barber moved the agenda be accepted; Roger Clarke seconded; Carried.

2. Role Call

Groups present were: 1st Aberfoyle; 1st Creekbank Alma; 2nd Guelph; 6th Guelph; 9th Guelph; 17th Guelph; 1st Hillsburgh.

3. President's Report

Popcorn - Karen Hewson, is co-ordinator again this year. A flier has been handed out and information will be in the next Woggle. Forms are in the Scout Shop as well as the participation signup sheet.

Pre-registration - a penalty for late registration has been implemented by Region. This cost will be passed down to groups. October 10 is the deadline for registrations. Penalty is \$2.00 per registration form. Youth registrations must be in within 4 weeks of the date the form is signed. Kathy will check with Region to see if there is a reduced fee after April 1.

Calendar fund-raising - National has made this fund-raiser mandatory for all groups. Each group will receive 2 calendars for each of last year's registered members (youth and adult). The cost to the group is \$1.00 per calendar. Groups will sell for \$5.00 each. Payment to District for the calendars is December 15, 2001. Each group will sign for the number they receive when the calendars are picked up. Concerns were raised over this being a mandatory fund-raiser. Concerns

or comments should be sent to the National Marketing Director. Email and snail mail addresses will be posted to the Web page. As an alternative, send these messages to the Scout Shop and a mass mailing will be done.

Hockey game November 9, 2001 - tickets are available now at the Scout Shop. There will be a District 50/50 draw fundraiser at the game. Volunteers are needed to sell the tickets, contact Steve Seifried if you can help.

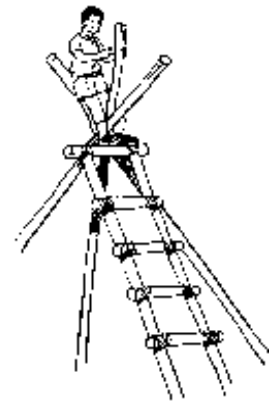

4. District Commissioner's Report

Sixer camp was well received. WIC/Regional Camporee is this weekend (Sept 28) and APL is coming up. Outdoor Activity forms should go to the Scout Shop for signature.

PYC weekend - program CD's were given out 1 for each section and distributed with calendars. Additional CD's are at the Scout Shop. These CD's belong to the Section and should be passed on if a Section Leader changes.

5. Treasurer's Report

Cathy Gill distributed copies of the 2001/2002 Budget which were then reviewed. Discussions were held on several items, including registration, store, program events. A new column ("Restated 2001 Actual") will be added to help reflect changes. Any donations received by groups should go through District so that a charitable receipt can be issued. 6. Atironta Regional VP report

Jane introduced Terry Hooper who recounted several instances where Scouts Canada insurance would not cover losses for incidents occurring in Wellington County. Insurance is becoming difficult to obtain and is more costly. Everyone needs to start paying attention and use risk management to keep instances down. Police checks must be done; signing leases

should not be done without understanding the risks involved; make sure registration forms are sent in on time and within proper time frames. Terry will determine how insurance covers parent drivers; volunteers.

7. New Business

8. Open Forum

A discussion was held on how we can get groups to meetings. A quorum is needed to conduct business for the District.

Kathy will find out when Jamboree On The Trail will be held and post information in the Woggle when the information is received.

Gerry Carr asked that everyone remove Wood Badge Part 1 from November 4, 2001, as there is no Wood Badge training that day. There will be a Gateway November 5, 2001.

Woggle is now online and already in the mail.

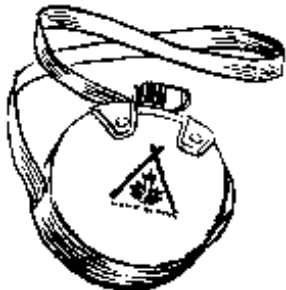


National Council has implemented a mandatory Calendar Fundraising initiative.

Each registered member (including all adult members i.e. Section Leaders, Group Committee members, Executive, Service Team) is to receive two calendars.

The calendar has value-added coupons attached to it and retails for \$5.00. All net proceeds are to be kept by the Group, that's \$4.00 profit per calendar sold or \$8.00 per member generated. The cost to the Group is a \$1.00 per Scout Calendar (or \$2.00 per registered member). Wellington District retains the profits from calendars sold by adults who are not registered with a Group.

Calendars can be picked up at the District Council meeting on Wednesday, September 26, 2001, or will be at the Scout office. An invoice will be issued at the time the calendars are picked up. Payment for the calendars from all Groups is due to Wellington District on December 15, 2001. Additional calendars may be available at the Scout Shop on a first come first serve basis.

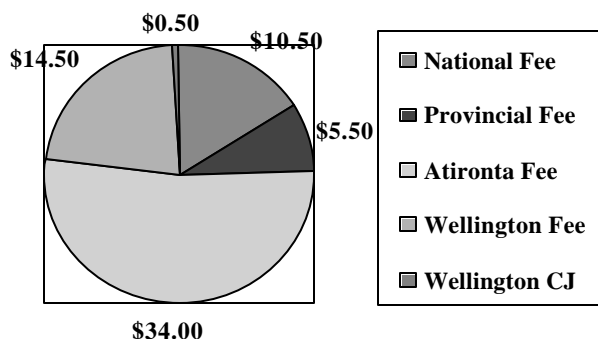
